Language Centre

The University Language Centre, 12 Woodstock Road, offers to students free of charge the following facilities: **Taught classes** in general language in French (5 levels), German (reading and speaking) (5 levels), Italian (5 levels), Mandarin Chinese (2 levels), Modern Greek (2 levels), Portuguese (2 levels), Russian (5 levels), Spanish (5 levels), and Welsh. There is also a programme of fee-paying certificate-bearing classes in French, German, Italian and Spanish which assume deeper commitment and a rapid pace. The library holds materials for private study in over 130 languages, and facilities for viewing live TV by satellite in a number of languages. Undergraduates and graduates are recommended to read through all sections of the list and not to focus narrowly on those specifically designated for particular options in examinations. Attention is also drawn to the General Scheme of Lectures which students are advised to use to plan their lecture attendance throughout the year.
